	Ebmud.com/drought reservoirs slightly above average. Board will revisit drought status April 2023.
2:10	Low-water ground covers discussion (lawn-look-alikes and other). The list below does not necessarily indicate approval of plants for EBMUD rebates.

Buffalo Grass - ("UC Verde Buffalo grass")

- General experience with it:
 - Watered 2x in summer (goes brown), 1x week for it to look like a grass
 - o Easily bounces back after 1 time water
 - Tolerates foot traffic
 - Good for dogs/pets; turns yellow from urine
 - Goes dormant and turns brown in winter (Dec April); some people have dyed green in the winter not recommended.
- Irrigation:
 - Rebecca used subsurface inline (but do not necessarily recommend hard to find leaks);
 could use spray
 - Water deeply for deep roots (up to 6ft); Deep roots support low-water requirements
- Maintenance:
 - Mow 1x a month
 - When longer it gets soft meadow-like
 - Grows more slowly than traditional lawn
- Establishment:
 - Weeds strong at installation, need to be vigilant against weeds during installation/establishment
 - 12" on-center; fills in very quickly within a season

Kurapia cultivar (sterile)

- UC Davis drought studies: low
- Compatible with drip
- Good foot traffic tolerance
- Rossmoor-Kurapia
 - HE nozzles
 - Looks good, doing okay
 - Sheet mulch before to make sure not too many weeds
 - Maintenance issue: people cutting it too short
- Downsides:
 - can get a little "woody" looking in colder part of year; very aggressive; bees
- Recommendation for irrigation: 20% ET

Phyla nodiflora native species

• Very aggressive – although native, tends to be more invasive the sterile from seed dispersal.

Clover – Trifollium repens

- WUCOLS: Moderate
- Concern: people using invasive oxalis species

Carex pansa (Asilomar)

- Moderate water use
- Compatible with drip
- Moderate for establishment; pretty-low after established
- Not a good idea to mow

Agrostis pallens (CA Bentgrass)

- Moderate water use
- Available as a sod at delta bluegrass
- Maintenance mow 1x a month or every 2 months; Issues with dead patches as meadow

Festuca rubra

- CNPS is recommending as a low water use native grass alternative
- Holds up well to traffic and pets
- Low water (may want a bit extra in summer)

Dymondia

- On EBMUD plant list low
- Low water
- EBMUD customers have been installing in rebate projects report that it can take some foot traffic

Creeping Thyme / Woolly Thyme

• Some success noted with thymes as a low water groundcover

Tradescantia

 Some success noted as a low water groundcover — Ruth Bancroft garden designers reportedly sometimes recommend

Polygonum

Some success noted as a low water groundcover

DROUGHT STAGE 2

- Mandatory 10% water reduction District-wide
- 8% drought surcharge on water used (starts in July)
- Section 28 water use restrictions found on ebmud.com/drought
- Excessive use penalty in effect above 1646 gallons/day residential. Fine \$2/unit above threshold (unit = 748 gallons)
- State Water Resources Control Board ban on watering non-functional turf. Does not apply to residential. Started June 16, 2022
