Background



- · Adopted in 1995, minor revisions in 1998
- Purpose: Manage lands and reservoirs to protect water quality and biodiversity
- Tiered plans address grazing, fuel/fire management, forestry, habitat conservation





- Description of watershed resources
- Management direction for natural resources, community use, and assets
- Reservoir-specific direction (San Pablo, USL, etc.)
- Interjurisdictional coordination

Why update the Master Plan?



- It's 20 years old
- Numerous developments include climate change, quagga mussels, HCP, and the need for adaptive management
- Significant progress on many fronts, prescribed actions accomplished
- Information on land use, management practices, and species needs updating



Sensitive species



- Documented over 1,400 species on the watershed
- · Over 119 Management Guidelines
- · Clear program guidelines
- Biodiversity, ecosystem processes, & water quality linked

What are the policy issues?



- Policy 9.04 governs watershed management and use, allows only those uses that can be "adequately monitored and managed by the District"
- Modifications to EBWMP only after public notification and hearing
- Frequent requests for new community uses on watershed lands (biking, dogs)
- · CEQA compliance
